VOLUNTEER POSITION DESCRIPTION

POSITION TITLE: Mobile Communications Unit (MOCOM) Driver / Operator

SUMMARY OF FUNCTIONS: As an on-call MOCOM responder. Either drives, operates or under special situations drives and operates the Mobile Communications Unit to areas within El Paso County and surrounding areas to setup and assist with communications on large incidences or functions.

<u>ESSENTIAL JOB FUNCTIONS:</u>	<u>FREQUENCY</u>
1. Be on call to support events.	Monthly
2. Respond to large scale events supporting Fire or Police actions.	Monthly
3. Respond to large events like sporting events, etc. to assist with communications.	Monthly / Weekly
4. Attend trainings and upgrades to the system.	Monthly to Bimonthly
5. Drive a fly / spotter car in support of the MOCOM Unit.	Monthly

OTHER JOB FUNCTIONS:

Clean and rehab the unit once it returns and keep minor maintenance records.

QUALIFICATIONS:

- Must meet the minimum age requirement of 18.
- Must be able to operate a vehicle and have a valid Colorado State Driver's License. (Driving the MOCOM itself must have a CDL).
- Must be able to use a two-way radio or have the ability to learn how to use one. EPSO ESD will train you to operate 800MZ radios.
- Must successfully pass a fingerprint-based background check, truth verification examination, and online Criminal Justice Information training.
- Must be able to work as part of a team.

LICENSES OR CERTIFICATES:

- To qualify to drive the fly / spotter vehicle. Possess a Colorado State Driver's License.
- To qualify to be a MOCOM driver you must possess a minimum of a Colorado State CDL driver's license.

WORKING CONDITIONS:

For the most part you will be working in a controlled atmosphere but will encounter inclement weather such as rain and snow and will have to work in that weather to meet the mission. There will be times that you might have to drive slick or hazardous road conditions. There is a risk of exposure to harsh environmental conditions, including wildland fires, police activity, hot dry weather and potentially long hours without a break.
