It is my honor and privilege to present to you our Annual Report for 2019. It has been an exciting year for the El Paso County Sheriff's Office with many successes and challenges. Despite the pressures placed on law enforcement across the nation, this Office again rose to the occasion as a premier law enforcement agency.

The BHCON (mental health co-responder) team had a very successful year in 2019. They provided services to 465 clients and diverted 98% of the calls from the jail. Another 92% of the calls were diverted from the Emergency Room at a local hospital. With such success, a second BHCON team was added in 2020.

We continue to grow and adapt as an organization. During 2019, we experienced a continual surge in the average daily population of our jail, it continues to be the largest single detention facility in the State of Colorado with an inmate population that averages 1,650 per day with the jail staff working diligently to lower the population.

We continued our increased efforts to combat and eliminate the illegal, black market marijuana industry brought by the passage of Amendments 20 and 64. We continued progress on several capital improvement projects, continued our efforts towards enhancing the relationships with our regional law enforcement partners and continued our participation on multi-jurisdictional task forces and joint training exercises.

This 2019 Annual Report recaps the outstanding accomplishments of each Bureau and Division of the Office. What I am continually impressed and humbled by is this amount of volunteerism, donations, and humble acts by our Office members out in the community. Whether it was participating in events such as Shop-With-A-Cop, Special Olympics of Colorado or dozens of other fundraisers and special events throughout the year, the El Paso County Sheriff's Office members show up in force to continue to support our community.

The nearly 900 employees of this Office, despite the pressures of the job, continue to show the utmost professionalism and investment into our community's safety. I am sincerely grateful for each and every member of the Sheriff's Office, both current and retired.

Again, I could not be more proud and humbled to have been elected as the Sheriff of what is now the largest Sheriff's Office in Colorado. It is undoubtedly one of the finest law enforcement agencies in the country.






WEAPONS / DRUGS FOUND IN THE FACILITY

Significant Narcotic Street Team Investigation

In September of 2019, detectives initiated an investigation into an individual selling cocaine out of a residence that directly bordered Sand Creek High School in the 3000 block of Heather Glen Dr. A buy/walk operation was completed at the end of September.

On September 09, 2019, the CSPD SRO for Sand Creek High School contacted MVNI about a suspicious vehicle parked in front of the target address. CSPD patrol contacted a male individual standing outside the vehicle who denied any knowledge of who owned the vehicle. As such, the vehicle was processed for impound. A significant amount of cocaine was found inside the vehicle passenger compartment along with evidence identifying a second person of interest. On September 14, 2019, MVNI detectives, with the assistance of TEU, executed a buy bust operation and search warrant at the suspects address on Heather Glen Drive. Narcotics were located inside the residence. On November 12, 2019, MVNI detectives conducted an additional buy bust operation near the intersection of Platte and Wahsatch on the second suspect. A subsequent search warrant was executed in the 800 block of West Washington St.

Subsequent investigation revealed that the two addresses were stash houses for narcotics. The following items were seized: .5 lbs. of Cocaine; 2169 Xanax pills; 465 MDMA pills; 74 dosage units of LSD; 179 grams of mushrooms; 3 lbs. of refined marijuana (bud); 19 grams of DMT; 26 dosage units of Fentanyl; 21 dosage units of various prescription pills; \$4675 cash; a ballistic vest; 3 firearms including an AK-47 assault rifle.



Significant Marijuana Regulatory Team Investigations

June 03, 2019, the MVNI Marijuana Regulatory Team executed a search warrant at 4625 Slocum Road, in unincorporated El Paso County regarding an illegal marijuana cultivation investigation. During the investigation, detectives discovered 87 marijuana plants, 18 pounds of refined product, 4 pounds of concentrate, 2 pounds of mushrooms, two handguns and a rifle. The resident was arrested for felony cultivation, possession of Schedule I controlled substance and operating a butane hash oil extraction lab.

November 18, 2019, the MVNI Marijuana Regulatory Team executed a search at Valor Court in unincorporated El Paso County. This search warrant was part of a long-term marijuana distribution investigation. Marijuana Regulatory Team detectives previously raided this residence in 2018. During the first raid, detectives seized over half of a million dollars in assets from the residence. Additional search warrants were authored and executed over the next several weeks. One of the search warrants was for a safety deposit box that contained over 1.35 million dollars in US currency.

Significant FBI Safe Streets Task Force Investigation

March 06, 2019, Metro VNI Lieutenant Mitchell received the following email from FBI RA Jon Cronan. I wanted to let you know about a case EPSO TFO Vince Sapp has been working on with our SSTF because Vince has done a great job at putting together one of the most complex Hobbs Act investigations I have seen federally prosecuted. On May 18, 2018 CSPD Robbery Unit met with FBI Safe Streets and AUSA Kurt Bohn about a series of robberies in the City and County committed by Rolling 60s Crips and a GD. In that group there were two leaders identified, Head of Organization Eric Coleman and Lieutenant Dustin Wall. These two individuals along with Dontai Luellen-Love were responsible for planning, conspiring to the series of robberies. CSPD Robbery Unit completed a complex investigation and FBI Safe Streets adopted the case once the majority of their case had been investigated. With the help of STIC analysts, FBI analysts, and some data analysis TFO Sapp was able to prepare the case for Federal Indictment. Initially Dustin Wall was not going to be charged in the State system but after additional investigation and analytical research, he was added to the indictment. On March 5, 2019, TFO Sapp testified in Grand Jury and was able to complete a 17-count indictment on seven defendants in the case for five bank robberies and three commercial robberies. With their arrests, there should be a significant disruption of the local Rolling 60's Crip set and the crimes they inflict on the community.

Significant DEA Task Force Investigations

In February of 2017, the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) Southern Colorado Drug Task-Force initiated an investigation titled "Operation Double Dippin". EPSO DEA Task Force Officer Wesley Yowell and CSPD Officer Thomas Goodwin were assigned as co-case agents for this investigation. Intelligence gathered during this investigation identified three organizational distribution branches. The primary distribution cell was linked to the Payan Drug Trafficking Organization based in Mexico. The Payan DTO is a major distributor of cocaine, heroin and methamphetamine to Colorado, Arizona, Utah, Washington, and other states. In April of 2019, the long hours, hard work and dedication put into this investigation concluded with the indictment and/or arrest of sixty-five (65) primary suspects. To date, forty (40) of the sixty-five (65) suspects charged have been arrested. This investigation resulted in the seizure of monetary assets valued at \$1.25 million, seven vehicles, 31 firearms, 126.6 pounds (57.4 kilograms) of methamphetamine, 25.5 kilograms (56.2 pounds) of heroin, and 15.3 kilograms (33.7 pounds) of cocaine. The disruption/ dismantling of the Payan DTO will have a substantial impact on illicit narcotics distribution up and down the Front Range to include the Pueblo and Colorado Springs communities and will dramatically improve the quality of life for the residents of both communities.



WORK ORDERS - BY MONTH








